- the logo is angled to represent the shape of the letter 'Q' for Queensland;
- the colours of the arms and print encompass part of the Centre's philosophy of justice (purple), dignity (white) and growth (green);
- the orange/red represents Aboriginal peoples who identify these colours with land; and
- the blue (water) represents the Torres Strait and South Sea Islander communities who have come across the ocean.

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A Little History

In February 2002, staff at CQU Mackay were approached by several community leaders in the area of domestic and family violence, as well as the Centre for Social Science Research (CQU), to consider submitting a tender. The tender needed to outline the vision for, and capacity to provide, a state wide service in the areas of evidence-based practice, research and education that would contribute to a reduction in the levels of tolerance in our various communities to domestic and family violence.

On 9 May 2002, Minister for Families Judy Spence announced in state parliament that funding of \$1.3 million over 3 years, for a new Centre for the Prevention of Domestic and Family Violence had been awarded to CQU Mackay. This announcement came after the initial call for tenders by the Department.

I would like to take this opportunity to say a substantial thank you to the core group of people who worked extremely hard during the tender process. This very committed group of people includes: Associate Professor Helen Waite, Delma Clifton, Vivien Clift, Trish Robins and Kerry Faux from the Faculty of Arts Health and Science (CQU Mackay); Dr Rod Jewel (sub-Dean) and Steven Pace from the Faculty of Informatics and Communication (CQU Mackay); Eunice Donovan (Social Worker and Director, Mackay Regional Council for Social Development); Sylvia Vermaat (Client Services Manager, Domestic Violence Resource Service, Mackay); Dr Fiona Millard (Division of General Practice, Aboriginal and

Islanders Community Health Service, both of Mackay); and Karen Andrew (Project Officer, Indigenous Women's Health Screening: Pilot Project, Mackay).

This group of people worked closely with approximately 30 organisations who provided invaluable input and feedback in the development of the philosophy, structure, operation and activities of the future centre. The successful tender was just the beginning of bringing together people who want to make a difference in our communities by working against domestic and family violence.

You will notice a third logo for the Centre of Social Science Research (C4SSR) on our publications. Our Centre is linked to the C4SSR as this research centre of the university has specialist research facilities and personnel to support the work against domestic and family violence. The C4SSR also has numerous multidisciplinary projects, national and international associates, as well as an overriding commitment to community partnerships and community capacity building through research and education. This means our Centre will have both professional and practical support as it sets out to provide an integrated state wide service in the areas of research, education and evaluation for the prevention of domestic and family violence.

Our time has just begun and we look forward to making history in partnership with those who are dedicated to working towards a safer and healthier life for everyone in every community across Queensland.

Advisory Groups

Advisory groups are a significant structure within the QCPDFV, and their role is to provide a pool of expertise and grass-roots knowledge to inform the direction of various activities of the Centre. Thus, advisory groups will provide clear and critical links between communities, government, universities and the Centre.

There will be three advisory groups established to support the three key areas of the Centre's work: research, education and evaluation. There are several reasons underlying the need for three groups:

- to maximise the opportunities for stakeholder participation in the projects of the Centre;
- the need for Queensland-wide representation in the work of the Centre;
- the scope and variety of activities in each of the key areas; and
- to allow each advisory group to concentrate on a primary area and provide a depth of experience and advice.

The Centre Director will be a member of each advisory group but will not Chair any group. The Chair of each advisory group will have a position on the Centre's Board of Management.

The issues that each group is likely to be addressing in the first 12 months of operation are as follows:

Research

- Family violence in Queensland Indigenous communities.
- Domestic and family violence in rural and remote Queensland.
- The effects of domestic and family violence on children.

Education

- Fact sheets and journals in relation to the three research areas.
- Training packages to meet the needs of service providers.

Evaluation

- Performance indicators.
- Development of benchmarks for best practice.

The Board of Management of the QCPDFV is now calling for expressions of interest from people with significant experience and expertise in one of the three key areas outlined above. It is suggested that you express your interest in only one of the advisory groups.

The Purposes of Advisory Groups

Each group will have the same general aims:

- to ensure grass-roots knowledge on issues from diverse communities, interest groups, cultural groups and geographic locations has a strong presence in all aspects of the work of the Centre;

- to provide a pool of expertise for the Centre to draw on;
- to provide a source of advice and a site of review of projects and other Centre activities;
- to assist the Centre to achieve its 12-monthly objectives and maximise the quality of its projects; and
- to develop and maintain effective partnerships between the Centre, community organisations, government departments and universities.

Some Organisational Matters

- 1 Each group will have up to 15 members.
- 2 After the second meeting a Chair will be elected who also will sit on the Board of Management.
- 3 Meetings will be held bi-monthly by tele-conference/videoconference with email discussions facilitating decision-making at other times as needed.
- 4 The first meetings will be held at 4 pm for each respective group. Thereafter the group can decide the most suitable times. However, the dates for meetings are fixed.

- Expressions of interest need to be received at the Centre by close of business Monday 9 September 2002.
- Expressions of interest can be by mail, fax or email.
- Board of Management will meet during the week 9-13 September 2002 to consider all expressions of interest.
- If more than 15 expressions of interest are received, the final composition of each group will be determined to ensure the greatest diversity of representation from all sectors across Queensland.
- It is anticipated you will have a reply to your expression of interest during the week of 16-20 September 2002.

Centre News

- Applications for the position of Director of the Centre closed on 14 August. The selection process is currently underway.

Dr Knapman has extensive experience in grant writing and has been successful in obtaining large and small Australian Research Council grants, as well as numerous grants from government and community organisations. Dr Knapman's specialised knowledge will assist us in ensuring that we are able to take advantage of funding opportunities, in order to develop innovative research projects within the Centre and in partnership/s, over the coming year.
- **Professor establishes international links with the Centre**

Professor William Lauder, newly-appointed Foundation Professor in Contemporary Nursing at Central Queensland University (CQU), was excited to hear of the new Queensland Centre for the Prevention of Domestic and Family Violence. Although not yet in Australia, Professor Lauder has initiated contact with Associate Professor Helen Waite, with research partnerships in mind.

Professor Lauder is currently promoting collaboration on family health research between the University of Arizona, Kent State University (both in USA) and his current university, the University of Stirling (Scotland). He stated that one of the leading collaborative partners at the University of Arizona has been researching

adolescent violence in rural areas, an area of research sure to be of significance to the Centre. He has also highlighted that groups in the UK and the USA are interested in social judgements and decision-making, with one dimension being cross-cultural differences.

Professor Lauder is looking forward to working with the Centre on issues related to domestic and family violence research, education and practice. His role in setting up collaborative links in research will benefit the Centre and its initiatives to identify social changes necessary to manage and reduce violence at multiple levels in our relationships, families and communities.

Research Scholarships

Would you like to be a paid researcher at the Centre? Yes?

CQU is offering a number of scholarships for people to complete full-time research degrees either at Masters or PhD level. The Centre has a number of innovative and exciting projects you can take up for either two years, for Masters by Research degree, or three years for a doctorate.

The scholarships offer tax-free support of approximately \$18,000 per year plus other financial benefits such as \$1,385 for relocation expenses.

Scholarships available include:

- Australian Postgraduate Award (APA).
- University Postgraduate Research Award (UPRA).
- Women's Equal Opportunity Postgraduate Research Award (WEOPRA).
- Indigenous Australian Postgraduate Research Award (IAPRA); there are five available in this category.

All scholarships are for Australian and permanent resident students.

Project Updates

Domestic and Family Violence in Mining Towns

Staff from the Centre travelled to Moranbah on 14 August to attend a meeting of interested people to discuss a new project, tentatively entitled *Bowen Basin Miners Against Family Violence*. The meeting was facilitated by Eunice Donovan from Mackay Regional Council for Social Development, with input from Hugh MacDougall, the Rural Family Support Worker with the Moranbah Neighbourhood Centre and Family Support Service, whose ideas and insights were the catalyst for this meeting.

The meeting included representatives from Billiton Mitsubishi Alliance (BMA), Department of Families, Department of the Premier and Cabinet, Mackay Regional Council for Social Development, local government and health and welfare services.

The meeting was proposed as a starting point to determine how key stakeholders could be involved in raising awareness of, and developing prevention strategies for, family violence in the Bowen Basin through an arts-based approach.

The meeting sought the commitment of various individuals and organisations to be part of a working party to develop programs and activities within the Bowen Basin region. Key stakeholders outside those already present were also identified, and will be invited to participate in the working party and any activities and/or programs developed.

An outcome of the meeting for the Centre was a request for support in the writing of grant applications and in the provision of research data.

Social Impact Study for Coppabella

The Centre for Social Science Research at CQU has been approached to undertake a study reviewing the economic, social and environmental impacts of the Coppabella Coal Mine on the Nebo Shire, and in particular on the townships of the Shire. Accordingly, Ruth Wood (QCPDFV) prepared a literature review and background paper specifically exploring family violence. The review identified that while family violence occurs across all communities regardless of socio-economic status, cultural background and place of residence, there was no doubt that the rates of reported family violence are higher in rural and remote areas than in metropolitan areas. Briggs (1990) argued that the development of new industries, such as mining, within

rural and remote areas may cause rapid growth within towns and shires without sufficient infrastructural support. Therefore, women moving to areas with employment opportunities for their partners may not be able to seek support as welfare agencies may not be within close proximity. In addition to the lack of support, women are often attempting to negotiate their way through relationships based within a private sphere of male power and dominance which, in the case of mining towns, is also overtly supported by a system of male power within the public arena. Mining towns are clear examples of "where the specific form of patriarchal culture is closely related to its economic base" (Collis 1999:61) and where communities also "epitomise the heart of Australia's 'blookeland' a cultural landscape dominated by big machinery, big machismo, big drinking" (Gibson 1994:63)

Preliminary discussions with welfare workers who support families within mining communities pointed to a number of specific issues which may increase the problems associated with family violence. Lack of external and family-oriented entertainment opportunities; coming from a working class background without having yet developed an appropriate culture of wealth thus getting caught in the trap of expenditure meeting or exceeding income levels; and women finding it difficult to seek assistance or even leave an unhappy or violent relationship because of their economic dependency on their partner's high income level - these have all been identified as contributing to the isolation of women and the high incidence of family violence. Further, industries which pay highly for unskilled labour also attract many families from non-English speaking backgrounds (NESBs) (Reeve 1994). A NESB woman suffering extreme family violence is unlikely to find help or support in rural and remote areas. As Gray et al (1991) stated in their Executive Summary, "NESB people are socially and geographically isolated within communities which are themselves isolated". The QCPDFV looks forward to working with the Centre for Social Science Research to find ways to promote an intolerance for domestic and family violence thus contributing to the overall safety and health of all, and especially those in rural and remote communities.

The Queensland Domestic Violence Services Network

The Queensland Domestic Violence Services Network (QDVSN) is a statewide body, comprising membership of the 12 regional domestic violence services across the state, the Immigrant Women's Support Service, the statewide Domestic and Family Violence Telephone Service, and the Queensland Centre for the Prevention of Domestic and Family Violence.

The QDVSN is a key stakeholder in guiding the strategic direction of domestic violence responses in Queensland. The QDVSN leads the way in lobbying, law reform and advocating for funding for gaps in services.

Recently, the QDVSN has been involved in the Legislation Reference Group, and most importantly, in the development of the Implementation Action Plan. The Violence Prevention Unit in the Department of Families is leading the development of this Action Plan. It is necessary that this Action Plan be developed and progressed by the key stakeholders prior to the proclamation of the amendments to the *Domestic Violence (Family Protection) Act 1989*.

The QDVSN met last week, via a teleconference, to collate the Network's contributions to the Implementation Action Plan. These contributions from QDVSN and the other key stakeholders have informed the Department of Families' preparation of three Issue Papers. The three papers are titled:

- Older People and People with Disabilities;
- Children and Young People; and
- Policing, Enforcement and Court Processes.

These issue papers will form the basis of discussion at a full-day planning workshop, to be held in Brisbane on 30 August 2002. The expected outcome will be the development of the full action plan, including the identification of the key tasks, priorities, timeframes and responsibilities to address the identified issues.
